## REFUGEE STORIES

In a makeshift camp in Bangladesh, 25-year-old Fatimah holds her new born baby. Fatimah gave birth to baby Halima in her home in Myanmar. She and her husband Razzaq, are amongst the more than 436,000 people who fled the sudden increase in violence in Rakhine State. Back home, this couple had a house and land in their village which provided them with a stable income. During the outbreak of the latest violence against innocent civilians, their house and belongings were burnt to the ground. And their other family members were shot. Now, they live in a make shift camp for new arrivals in Bangladesh. They received treatment and food at the AMWT medical camp. Al Mustafa has also provided them clothes and sleeping mats.

Nurual Haque, a 42-year-old shopkeeper is one of the few men who made it here from his village. He carried one child on his back and another tied to his chest and walked for 9 days without food. They foraged for what they could in the jungle. "We ate banana palms, and drank rainwater from the leaves," he said. Upon arrival at Cox's Bazar he was weak, dehydrated and barely able to walk. He and his small family are currently receiving regular rations at the AMWT kitchen. AMWT has also sponsored him with some seed money to start his own small business.



## CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE

During his 7th Visit to Cox' Bazar, AMWT Chair Abdul Razzaq Sajid commented: "It is never easy to witness the fear and pain of human beings who have nothing in this world, yet are treated like cattle, I have seen the suffering and deprived living conditions of the Rohingya Muslims first-hand. Yet every person I met received me with warmth and many thanked Al-Mustafa and its supporters for everything we have been doing. As previously I left them with a heavy heart and a promise that we would continue to help them and pray for their safety."

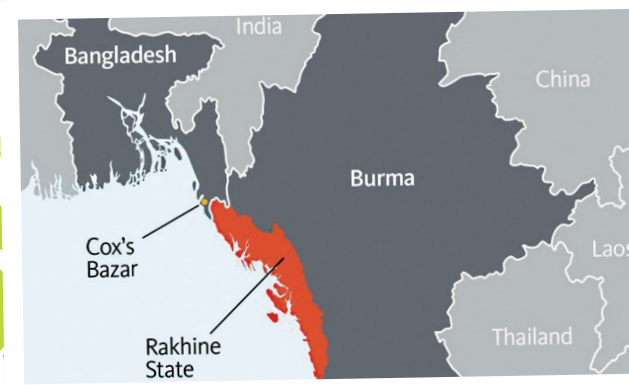

## THE JOURNEY FROM BURMA BEGINS FOR 700,000 ROHINGYA REFUGEES

Imagine carrying what little remains of your worldly possessions and walking for six days with no food and water, that is the reality of those who came from Burma to Cox's Bazar in Bangladesh.

**NAIMA MOBORAK'S STORY**  
"I travelled through the jungle with my one year old child without shoes, on an empty stomach and indescribable pain in my feet. It rained constantly making it difficult to wade through the mud and bushes. It took 4 days to arrive here in Cox's Bazar, I will never forget this nightmare"



## AL MUSTAPHA FIELD TEAM ARRIVES IN COX BAZAR

Our team made their first visit on the 16th of September 2017, distributing food packs to over 20,000 desperate families who were continuing to arrive having travelled 150km, 1 in 10 women were said to be pregnant.

## SHELTERING THOUSANDS OF NEW REFUGEES

Rohingya refugees in Bangladesh are scattered in various locations, primarily in two registered camps, makeshift areas, spontaneous new settlements, as well as in host communities. New arrivals are in dire need of shelter, food, health care, WASH and protection.

- Delivery Program
- Begin Shelter Building
  - Distribute Hygiene Kits
  - Distribute Tents
  - Start WASH Project
  - Provision of Children's Nutritional Supplements



## SIGNING OF BILATERAL ARRANGEMENT

The Governments of Myanmar and Bangladesh signed a bilateral 'arrangement' on the return of refugees to Myanmar. AMWT engaged both governments and raised concerns with the UN & UNHCR about the treatment of repatriated Rohingya.

- Launch of AMWT Mental Health Support Service
  - Nutritional Supplement Program for Pregnant Women
  - Commencement of Children Protection Project
  - Distribution of Mosquito Nets



## CONDITIONS WORSEN IN CAMPS

The AMWT team makes its fourth official visit. The number of refugees hits a high of 800,000, amongst whom 440,000 are children and 1 in 10 women are either pregnant or breastfeeding mothers.

  - Upgraded Shelter Kits
  - New Installations of Water & Sanitation
  - Additional Sleeping Mats



## A CHALLENGING START TO THE NEW YEAR

Camps are saturated, large numbers of children, many of them separated from family members are identified, along with single women and elderly. Many new arrivals are visibly traumatised and disoriented as a result of suffering extreme violence and sexual abuse.

- Deployment of Additional Health Staff & Medicines
  - Funding of Ambulance & Referral Services
  - Building of Emergency Medical Facilities
  - Providing Thermal Fleece Blankets



## ASSISTANCE BEGINS TO DIMINISH

Despite their hardships, there is little sympathy towards the Rohingya in Burma. Anti-Rohingya sentiment is widespread, the authorities call them immigrant "Bengalis", the Myanmar democracy movement remains silent and the world begins to look the other way.
